PARISH COUNCIL

Representatives from Anglian Water attended the February Parish Council meeting to tell us about their proposals to replace ageing water mains. Pegsdon's water supply has failed completely on 8 occasions in 12 months due to bursts. The company intends to replace 2.7 kms of pipe, starting where it enters the parish along the road from Lower Gravenhurst at the bridge near Discolicious. When that is completed, the section along Hanscome End Road would be replaced followed by Apsley End Road and on towards Pegsdon. For the safety of the contractors and the public, road closures will be necessary but the length affected at any one time will be kept to a minimum to reduce inconvenience to residents and businesses.

They said they hoped to begin in April and councillors were concerned about the short notice and requested the company to contact those who would be affected urgently about the disruption they would suffer. We also noted that another Anglian Water project is scheduled to block the road outside their reservoir on the approach to Meppershall during May and were concerned that additional traffic problems would result if the two overlapped. A road closure notice was issued effective from 8 April but as Parish News goes to press, we hear that it is now likely to be mid-May or June when they start and some of the work may be delayed until 2025.

Pegsdon residents have successfully met their target for purchasing a defibrillator, with a generous benefactor donating the final £62.00. The Parish Council had previously agreed to cover this and has asked CBC if this funding could be diverted towards the repair and updating of the one at the Congregational Church.

An employee of Woods Hardwick attended the March meeting on behalf of the owner of Thomas's Meadow and asked what we would like to see on the site. The councillors were wary of making any comments that could be misinterpreted (as has happened elsewhere in an attempt to show that there was local support for development) and repeated the grounds used successfully to oppose previous planning applications for the site.

Central Bedfordshire Council has a Local Plan to guide development in the area in the years to come and without one, the government has the power to instruct it what to build and where. The current plan makes provision for around 39,350 new homes and at least 24,000 new jobs by 2035 and some of these have already been provided. It claims that our great location and transport links mean more people than ever want to live and work here and that we must create more jobs, grow the local economy, keep improving our transport networks and protect and enhance what residents love about where they live.

The Local Plan must be reviewed regularly and Councillors John Hyde, Annie Palmer and Derek Turner attended workshops recently to hear about progress towards implementing the current plans and how its successor would be finalised during 2027-8. We were also asked for our initial thoughts about what else we would like to see taken into account. Many of those present expressed concern about the assumptions that continuous development is required and the damage it would cause to the environment. Further public consultation will take place soon and continue while the next Plan is being compiled.

The Parish Council is chasing housing providers Grand Union and the Peabody Trust as well as CBC Highways on multiple issues including potholes, paths, fencing and parking. The Chair met with a Grand Union representative in February to show them the state of the verges in Greenfields and invited them to suggest a solution. The parking problem had been exacerbated when football matches were taking place, so the Chair met with his counterparts on the Playing Field Management Committee and Shillington AFC to discuss how to mitigate this in future. AFC have now produced an action plan that includes parking guidance for parents of players in home and visiting teams and we will monitor its effectiveness.

The Parish Council has requested data about speeding traffic from the Police Traffic Management Unit (TMU) at two more locations to help our case for further traffic calming measures. We have seen their enforcement vehicle in the village recently, which is welcome.

With climate change taking place and flooding occurring in the Central Bedfordshire Council area following heavy rain, their officers are approaching parish and town councils about setting up a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). It seems that this would be a group of local people who could offer assistance to residents affected by flooding or other serious incidents. We look forward to finding out more about the scheme and if we participate, we will seek potential volunteers to help run it.

SPARROWS – MY CHEEKY HOUSEMATES

It's April - I love this month! It's so good to be woken up by birdsong and sunlight rather than my phone alarm going off in the pitch black.



The house sparrows are now scratching about in the eaves of my house, busily sorting out their old nests. They pair for life, although the occasional 'fling' isn't out of the question, and they usually use the same nest site. It sounds as if I have a small community of them nesting underneath the guttering and tiles. My cheeky

little squatters seem to be perpetually arguing or chattering. They possibly aren't doing my lovely old home much good; however, these birds are believed to bring blessings and happiness to a household so I'm turning a blind eye to any potential damage they might be doing!

Most modern houses don't have the nooks and crannies in which house sparrows can make a nest and raise their chicks. These birds, like many other species, are in trouble so putting up two or three wooden nest boxes high up on your house wall would really help them. The advice is to avoid placing boxes in direct sunlight and to put them in a quieter position (not above a well-used path or door).

I have a bird table, with a dish in which I put seeds, and three bird feeders. To prevent the spread of diseases, I wash them fairly regularly (every couple of months or so). I didn't realise until recently that this isn't enough — they need to



be washed at least once a month. I've also learnt that a disease called trichomonosis is killing house sparrows and finches, particularly greenfinches. One study suggests that this disease accounts for 62% of all greenfinch, chaffinch and sparrow mortality annually in the UK. I'll definitely be giving the feeders a good scrub more often from now on. I use warm, soapy water and rinse well.

It was upsetting to hear about trichomonosis. Birds have enough problems coping with the harm we are doing to them and their habitats without this. The use of pesticides and the loss of wildlife habitats to development are the main drivers of bird population declines. Using chemicals in our gardens is causing their numbers to decline even more - if everyone stopped applying insecticides, fungicides and weedkillers, it would give our beautiful feathered friends a chance to survive, to increase in numbers and to thrive.



House sparrows will eat most types of food put out in gardens; they definitely aren't fussy eaters. However, during the breeding season, they need to feed their young with juicy insects and bugs such as aphids and caterpillars. This is one

reason why we shouldn't be using pesticides, particularly insecticides (it's in the name), in our gardens.

If you go into a garden centre, they'll have an area selling products such as bird food and wildflower seed to help save wildlife. However, a few steps away, they'll have merchandise for sale that kills it. We need openness and honesty; displaying health warning signs, like those on cigarette packets, stating that pesticides kill wildlife and us (they cause cancers etc) would be a step in the right direction. We are told that these products are safe to use if the instructions are followed but the scientific evidence is now there – they are not. Actually, thinking about it, shops and garden and DIY centres shouldn't even be selling these awful products.

NO THROUGH ROAD

So I was travelling along a familiar road to get home and then I came to a roundabout when that sign appeared 'NO THROUGH ROAD'! The road ahead was fully barricaded off so no hope of trying to slip through and hope.... Well I have to go on the diversion road.



I had to say it was feeling great to be on a lovely smooth surface with no potholes. I also soon realized what a beautiful view was all round me with unobstructed open landscape of fields and hedges. All too soon it seemed I was at a point which I recognized as part of a familiar way home. I had to admit that this diversion was much quicker than the road that I normally took. So summing up the diversion had given me welcome benefits; none of the usual stress of bumps and hazards; a refreshing new view; quicker route to my destination. Yes I will use this road again without the need for a diversion being in place.

Now I know not all diversions can be like this. Anyhow this time it was good. It made me reflect on how in life so often I can struggle with any sense of change of plan or maybe a suggestion of another way of doing things.

I have had to acquiesce at times that there are better alternatives despite not either looking for them or accepting them willingly. The new choice of another view can be revitalizing.

Of course, often like the need for that 'NO THROUGH ROAD', the reason for the closure is for some real issue that has to be addressed. Some other priority has taken over from my routine plans. In life maybe at times it is someone else's real needs that have to be considered instead of our own personal desires or aims. This alternative choice may be making us less selfish and more aware of others.

Now there can be many issues here such as, it is testing when there are too many diversions on our routes, or we feel it is costing us time and money. Even so in real life terms maybe we do need to face the fact that really helping and caring about others will cost us time, money and more besides.

Many volunteers do so much great and good work which is rarely valued in money or time, but they have most likely decided to take another route than keeping to the easier personal routine. There are needs for all kinds of volunteering which call on any of us to respond positively and open up roads that are closed at present but where no work is being done.

I thank all those who have chosen that other route and which gives so much to our community life. For many of us worship is like this – not a must but a voluntary act.

REPORT FROM COUNCILLOR BLAKE STEPHENSON - April 2024 -

Council Tax increases from April:

Diaries have been jam-packed with budget meetings over the past few months, and there's no doubt that it has been a tough year to balance the books. But the group of Independent Councillors eventually got their budget passed in February. Central Beds' share of Council Tax has



increased by 4.99%. And increases to fund the Parish, Beds Police, and the Beds Fire & Rescue Authority will also flow through and be included in our next bills. Various services are being cut too!

Coming soon ... £55/year for garden waste collections:

Despite my best efforts to protect free garden waste collections, changes have been approved and at the time of writing are being rushed out. Conservatives wanted this idea to be scrapped entirely, and we even proposed a fully funded one-year delay so time could be spent designing a solution that everyone could get behind. But we were out voted in Council. Many of you have told me that you're worried about fly-tipping and bonfires, amongst other things. So please keep in touch with issues and concerns, to help me scrutinise Central Beds' plans.

But there is some good news ...

My campaign to protect 37 bus services throughout the county (including the 79 through Shillington) was a success, with plans to axe subsidies dropped. And, having secured widespread support in Council, I'm also pleased that £10m has now been setaside to back our NHS. Central Beds isn't responsible for healthcare, but it needs to show leadership on what is a priority for our rural communities.

And finally ... more good news ... Greenwoods is REFUSED!

Central Beds refused planning permission on 5th March, citing concerns about harm to; the green belt, heritage assets, landscapes (including views to/from the Chilterns), the character of our area, ecology, prime agricultural land, and more. The developers may still appeal, so we'll need to stay on our toes, ready to fight to protect our countryside at every twist and turn. But for now, a big thank you to everyone!

PEGSDON VIEW



This week it finally feels like spring has sprung after a pretty wet winter. Snowdrops that were in evidence a couple of weeks ago have passed and the daffs are now nodding at me along the road. We did a little bulb planting in November at 3 key points of Pegsdon and have been watching and waiting, some of those bulbs are now popping up which is very satisfying. Hopefully we'll keep adding more over time and Pegsdon will become a blaze of colour each spring. I'm hoping this will become one of the things that remind people that this is a home for our little community.

Speeding on the Hitchin Road continues to be a blight and delivery drivers and our postie receive abuse from drivers when pulling over to make their deliveries. We've sadly had the first 2 road traffic accidents of the year in the usual spot, on the way out of Pegsdon towards Hitchin. We've reported 6 fly tipping incidents to the council so far this year and we hear they are considering deploying concealed cameras in a couple of the hotspots, though I think we are not the worst affected so may not be high up on the list. Disturbingly two of the most recent incidents have been dumped in the middle of the road, no attempt to keep the highway clear, including wood and nails, so a clear hazard to passing car tyres.

Thankfully the CBC waste teams are extremely responsive in these instances. I do feel a bit inured to it all now though, desensitised by the frequency and the familiarity of it. I'm reminded by my good friend Claire that the definition of insanity is doing the same thing and expecting a different result. At some point we hope that CBC and the Highways team will do something different and

make these roads safer. The thing that does cheer me up? Clarke Transport lorries, every time they see me walking my dog, if it's safe to do so, they pull out wide on the road and give us more room as they pass. My little rescue doesn't then skit away, and I exchange a little thank you wave with the drivers. Brightens my day, that little spot of consideration and kindness.



In other news, the first Chapter25 bookclub meetup took place at The View, great fun. The opinions on the book were very mixed but ultimately it scored pretty highly on the approval ratings across the book groups who read it. I'm looking forward to the next, first Tuesday of the month, check out the Chapter25 website or facebook page if you'd like to join in.

We've had some brilliant live music events, karaoke, which I especially enjoyed (not so sure about my audience though!), and more to come. Easter brings a family fun day and a quiz night. Lots to look forward to in the next few weeks with more live music and some biker nights, do keep an eye on The View SG5 social media pages or drop in and check out their events board.



Finally, I'm so pleased to report that the defibrillator is now fully funded and the final arrangements are now being made for installation. We should have a fully functioning defibrillator in Pegsdon within the next couple of months.

Wishing you safe and well, give us a little wave next time you are passing through.



OUR BEAUTIFUL CHURCHYARD



ALL SAINTS CHURCH SHILLINGTON

With longer days and, we hope, better weather it's likely that even more people will be walking through or relaxing in our

village churchyard. Because of this, we thought it would be an ideal time to explain who is responsible for the care of the churchyard and how it is looked after.

All Anglican churches are part of a wider community called a Diocese, which is usually centred on a cathedral. All Saints Church in Shillington is part of the Diocese of St Albans, and it is the Diocese which sets regulations for churchyards in its area. The details of these can be found at: -

However, day to day care is usually the responsibility of the individual church's council, known as the Parochial Church Council (PCC for short). It is only if a churchyard is closed for further interments that it may become the responsibility of the local Parish or District council. In Shillington the PCC still has the responsibility for the care of the churchyard. It is also privileged to be a designated **County Wildlife site** and to be part of **the Living Churchyard Scheme**. This is why areas of our churchyard are left uncut for much of the year to promote wildlife.

The fact that the churchyard is so freely used by the whole community is a great joy, but we would ask that the area is used respectfully: -

- Please keep dogs on leads and clear up after them. There is still a distressingly large amount of dog mess left in the churchyard.
- If **horses** are ridden through the churchyard, please would riders also clear up after them. Horse dung on the footpaths is deeply unpleasant for everyone else.
- Please could **graves and cremation plaques** be kept tidy. If tributes are left but not later removed when broken or past their best, the churchyard team have to do this to keep areas safe and cared for.
- Please **take care** when using the churchyard. Although we check the state of headstones, they can shift and become hazardous. Also, given the size and location of the churchyard we are unable to prevent rabbit holes and wasp nests appearing.

RAMBLING ON with DEREK TURNER

I've said it before but it's easy to take our good fortune to live in a peaceful and relatively prosperous place for granted. Our lifestyles are made easier by the invention and availability of metals, glass, plastic, running water, electricity, the internal combustion engine and much more. We can assume that food will be always available despite most of us having nothing to do with growing it ourselves. We have computers and phones that enable us to find out or obtain almost anything at a click or keystroke.



It wasn't always so and yet people managed. How did they do it? One way to answer this is to look around the world at the diminishing number of people whose way of life has scarcely been affected by western 'civilisation', to see how they get by. When I was young,

such people were usually considered to be savages, inferior to us and often treated harshly by our selfish and arrogant ancestors who took their land and enslaved many. However, excellent TV programmes by the likes of Simon Reeves present a very different picture and let us appreciate their ability to live comfortably using only locally available and sustainable resources.

Sadly, many are threatened by foreign-owned mining companies and large-scale farming operations which covet their ancestral lands. Closer to home, we can find clues about the past beneath our feet. At Must Farm, a small riverside settlement near Peterborough, archaeology has revealed incredible details about everyday life in the Bronze Age. In about 850BC, a catastrophic fire engulfed 11 large, circular thatched huts built on stilts over the shallows of a river. The charred remains and contents collapsed into the water where deep mud quickly covered and preserved them until they were discovered in a quarry 2,800 years later. Items made of wood and fibres as well as food residues that would have rotted away quickly on most sites away were preserved well, along with tools, clothing and decorated beads. They tell us that people who lived there ate a healthy diet and had spare time to engage in creative activities.

Here in Shillington, conditions for preservation are less favourable but we can still seek clues beneath our feet. Last year was the eleventh that I've led a team investigating Shillington's history by digging one metre square archaeological test pits at sites around the village. Our most ancient finds are flints

that were knapped or broken in a way that gave them a sharp edge. Some are large enough to fell trees but others were small including arrow heads for hunting wild animals and 'knives' for skinning them and cutting up their meat. We've also discovered much pottery and it is particularly useful as we can tell how, when and where it was made and its likely use.



Long ago, someone discovered that clay could be wetted and moulded into shape then fired to solidify it. The finished product held water and withstood heat. It could be used for cooking food, making it easier to digest. Mixing with the clay a little temper consisting of small fragments of stone, ash or leaves made the pot less likely to shrink or crack when fired and more robust. The oldest pottery we've found in Shillington is probably 3,000 years old - slightly earlier than the Must Farm finds. Five of the locations we investigated last year produced results that were among the best yet.

Take prehistoric pottery made before the Romans colonised Britain in AD43. We found crude flint-tempered fragments of vessels that had been fired in a bonfire between 1200 & 600 BC at both Marquis Hill and at the far end of Woodmer Close, having previously found some of similar antiquity at Shillington Bury and the Old Vicarage. Pottery made during Roman rule which ended in AD 410 turned up again too in a test pit at another location in Woodmer Close near the bungalows.


The 26g of it was the second largest haul so far. It exists in at least a quarter of the places we investigated and its distribution suggests that people were living in small family farms, dotted across the landscape. We also found a Roman coin - admittedly of low value - at Marquis Hill.



What did the Romans do for us, you may ask? For one thing, they made agriculture more efficient and food production increased to feed a growing population with plenty spare for export. They also wrote things down. After they left in AD 410, few people

learned to write, perhaps because they had other things on their mind. The climate seems to have taken a turn for the worse and crop yields fell. Some died from starvation or from the plague. However, people such as the Angles, Jutes and Saxons eyed up England's green and pleasant land from across the North Sea and sensed that new opportunities to improve their own lives had arrived. Some came over and stole cattle or fought the natives along the coast. In time, others moved further inland and settled down to live among the locals.

For the first time last year, we unearthed pottery from this period in Shillington. Small pieces of simple, plain vessels in sandy or organic-tempered pottery turned up at Marquis Hill and at the end of Woodmer Close. They can't be dated precisely but pottery expert Paul Blinkhorn places them after AD 450 and before 850. During the 9th century, people moved from their separate farmsteads to live in closer proximity to each other. We don't know why but it led to the formation of villages such as Shillington, Pegsdon or Higham. It may have coincided with a switch to growing more arable crops in large 'Open Fields' in which farmers co-operated with their neighbours to plough the land or get in the harvest while conditions were at their optimum.



My 2023 test pit report is nearly finished and will appear soon on the Shillington hub at https://shillington-history.org.uk/shillington-archeology. So where will we dig this year? It depends on you, dear reader, coming forward to help or offer us a plot to work on as 80 of you have generously done since we began in 2013. Please contact me and arrange a visit and discuss the potential for finding more clues to our past where you live.

'Use it or lose it' - the loss of facilities in the local area continues. Further to Henlow dog track's recent demise, I hear that Hexton School is closing. For decades Mrs Ashley-Cooper from Hexton Manor spent a great deal of energy cajoling everyone she met to send their children there and people told us what a good school it was. Our daughter Hazel started there but never got on well with Mrs Britton, who taught the infants in a stern, strict and very traditional manner. Hazel transferred to Shillington where the atmosphere was more relaxed and enjoyable and she was much happier and blossomed. Hexton has changed since but without a local champion to boost the numbers, attendances dwindled and Hertfordshire County Council tried to shut it in 2021. They were persuaded to give it another chance but to no avail. The school roll has dwindled since then and it closes officially on 14 April.



SHILLINGTON CHILDMINDERS

Childminders provide safe, friendly home environments for children to play and have fun whilst gently learning through their play. We take children on outings to farms, play centres, splash parks, museums and libraries, as well as teach them life skills such as helping to do shopping, gardening and cooking.

We are individually registered to Ofsted, have public liability insurance, follow the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum, undertake regular training including Safeguarding and First Aid and receive regular newsletters and bulletins from professional organisations.

We provide the children with opportunities to learn social skills and experience different play resources at baby/toddler groups and other settings. We are able to cover holidays and other absences for each other where possible.

Some of us are able to provide up to 15 hours of free childcare a week for eligible 2 year olds, as soon as care starts, in the same way that nurseries and pre-schools can. We are also able to provide the free sessions for all 3 and 4 year olds; at least 15 hours per week or up to 30 hours per week (for 38 weeks of the year) depending on parental eligibility and the childminder's policy. The free sessions normally start the term after the child's 3rd birthday. There may be additional charges to cover e.g. food and outings.

We each have differing childcare availability such as before and after school care, daytime childcare, overnight childcare, ad-hoc care or flexible care e.g. for shift workers.

"HIP HIP HOORAY - GARDENING ALL THE WAY"

Hooray! Gardening season is well underway. Mulching my beds I noticed soo many plants popping up, their fresh green shoots emerging. Winter is finally behind us.

This is such an exciting time the whole of the gardening season to look forward to and everything literally springing to life, buds opening and the cheery daffodils greeting us, bobbing their heads on verges as we pass. Colour is filling the garden after what seems like a long wet winter.

As I sit in the garden there is a warmth to the sunshine and it is a pleasure to be outside. Back to having a quick cuppa and checking on progress, the birds singing what could be nicer. Well that or going to the Garden centre! Once there you are like a child in a sweet shop! Your mind races at what you could grow.

You walk down aisles of colourful seeds and Dahlias. Treat yourself and get growing! The magic of the first seedling never tires and the satisfaction when the plant is blooming is tremendous. Going out and cutting flowers for your house and bringing in a bunch is a lovely thing to do. Enabling you to really study the flowers and admire their scent, shape and form up close.

Annuals are great border fillers for extra colour. Particular favourites of mine are Cosmos. These are easy to grow and offer bloom after bloom. Pinch out when growing to ensure a bushy plant

full of flowers. Just dead head and they will flower right into Autumn. They give height and a Cottage garden feel. Are great as a cut flower and there are many varieties and colours to choose from. A gorgeous new variety is Apricot Lemonade.



Another unusual plant but dead easy to grow is Cerinthe major Purpurascens. Originally from Australia. Has unusual almost waxy green grey foliage similar to Euculptus with a purple, tiny drooping flower. What I love most is the bees adore it so it's great in gardens. Zinnias are also a lovely flower. They make a vibrant display. Also great as a cut flower.

For children start them off with fast growing plants to keep their interest. Radishes are great for this and they will love harvesting these. Nasturtiums are good as they are quick to get growing and you can eat the flower and leaves and make a salad look so pretty. Of course Sunflowers are always a favourite. You could always have a competition to see who can grow the tallest one!



So you can see for a couple of pounds how much you can get out of these tiny unassuming little seeds! And come Autumn you can collect their seed and save even more! So it will be money well spent! You don't get much bang for your buck these days, but with seeds

this is an exception!
