PARISH COUNCIL

Following earlier uncertainty about the timescale for replacing the leaking mains which have caused interruption to the water supply to Pegsdon on numerous occasions, Anglian Water have confirmed that work will start on Monday 3 June. Initially, the length between the bridge on the road to Lower Gravenhurst near Discolicious and Hanscombe End will be renewed. The company expect to finish this section by 19 July to avoid causing lengthy diversions for farmers when they are busy harvesting crops. Replacing the remainder of the pipe along Hanscombe End Road, Apsley End Rd and on towards Pegsdon has been deferred until 2025.

With the cost of electricity as volatile as ever, the parish council consults Utilitrack for advice about the contract for power to the streetlights around the village. We decided to continue with existing supplier, SSE, for the next 24 months.

At the Annual Meeting in May, councillors selected members for various positions for 2024-5. They voted to re-elect John Hyde as the chair for 2024-5 and Derek Turner as vice-chair. Liam Keane will represent the council on the Village Hall Committee. Tracey Petrie, Richa Mitra and John Hyde will serve on the Playing Field Management committee and John Hyde, Derek Turner, Tracey Petrie and Blake Stephenson on the Risk Management Working Party.

To save time at its monthly meetings, the Parish Council has set up more working groups to carry out research in various areas and make recommendations. An Environment Working Group will consider topics such as tree planting and grass cutting around the village. Another group will look into funding and grants and a third will deal with tenders before contracts with suppliers are renewed. Issued discussed will be reported to the full parish councils meetings where final decisions will be made.

The Parish Council has received data from the Speedwatch volunteers who have been busy, holding 5 sessions in both March and April. Between the start of the year and 5 May, the team has been out 18 times in total, monitored over 1,300 passing vehicles and recorded 94 motorists travelling at 35mph or more and considerably more than that in some cases. More locations where the team can operate are under consideration. The team pass information to Bedfordshire Police Traffic Management Unit who use it to decide where to deploy their 'speed traps'. Be warned that these may appear anywhere around the village at any time.

Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) has received reports about flooding after heavy rain fell during the winter. A ditch used to run along the end of gardens of homes in the lower part of Bury Road, intercepting surface water coming from the playing fields area. During dry years, there was little flow in the ditch and some householders replaced the section across their land with a pipe. However, water is pooling near some homes, implying that there is a blockage somewhere along the line of the ditch.

At the end of March, a parish councillor met the Senior Drainage Engineer from the Flood Risk Management Team at Central Bedfordshire Council who is investigating the situation to seek a remedy.

Councillors welcomed the decision by CBC to reroute a part of public footpath 20 where it has been impassable in a field behind Woodmer Close. However, it will take a while before the path is usable once more as work is required including making a gap in a hedge and installing fencing and a new footbridge over a ditch. Elsewhere, Bridleway 8 from the church to Hanscombe End was dug up to unblock a pipe during the winter leaving a very muddy stretch for riders and walkers to negotiate. We are told that remedial work will be carried out there shortly. With vegetation growing rapidly and stretched resources at Central Bedfordshire Council limiting the amount of path maintenance and mowing that they can afford, the footpath officers are seeking volunteers to help with simple tasks to keep the footpath network walkable. We're also calling for Volunteers to co-ordinate and help with setting up a village **CERT** (**Community Emergency Response Team**). This would be a Whatsapp group to respond quickly and locally to events prior to help arriving from the authorities, emergency services, and utility providers. Twice in the last month volunteers from other village organisations have reacted to events to make people aware and slow traffic for a water mains burst which collapsed a large section of Hillfoot and a large branch that had fallen into the carriage way on Hillfoot Road. These were two adhoc events but some sort of more organised coverage would have been good. Contact Clerk to Council if you are able and willing to join this Team.



Following the investment of much time and funding for the new Play Area and equipment in early 2020, we were very disappointed to note what has recently happened to the seat for the Zipline. Obviously been chewed on a regular basis by a large dog. We can't believe the owner would have just stood there (with the dog on a lead as a requirement on our playing field) watching the animal

chewing its way through the rubber. A replacement seat has now been ordered and will be installed as soon as received.

As we like to cater for all of our village residents, maybe we need to consider a dog play area, as some neighbouring villages are now able to offer this facility. Pets can then have their own equipment in a secure location, leaving other equipment safe and usable for those it is intended.

BE CAREFUL WHAT YOU WISH FOR!

I really must be more careful what I wish for. May 3rd was, like too many this spring, a miserable day with mist and low grey cloud hanging on the distant hills, bursts of heavy rain followed by mizzling and water everywhere. I spent the day wishing that the sun would come out and that things would dry up.

That evening, the weather forecast sounded very promising so I put a load in the washing machine. The rain stopped, the puddles dried up ... and so did the water in my taps. What little that did come out became so muddy I could have grown cabbages in it. I hastily turned off the machine.

The mains had burst across the way from me and, bless them, two Anglian Water men spent the night trying to sort the leak out. My water supply was restored at 4.00pm which was wonderful – the machine went back on.

I woke early the next morning to bright blue skies. I thought I'd make the most of it and put another load on. Soon afterwards, I went to wash my hands and the tap instantly ran dry. I hastily turned off the machine. I began to think the thing was jinxed. I thought that before putting on the next load, I'm having a cup of tea, doing the washing up, and going the loo (in that order) - these were the three things I'd regretted not doing, both times, before the water was cut off.

Not having any water coming out of the taps certainly made me appreciate how lucky I am to have this luxury. The first morning that I had no supply, I remembered that I hadn't emptied the hot water bottle that I'd had a couple of nights before. I used this water to have a wash (I didn't fancy making a cup of tea with it) — it made me realise just how little I need to be able to do this.

We have been informed that in less than twenty years our taps will run dry (The Rivers Trust). It's not that we haven't been warned. With regard to our area, we were told twenty years ago that: "technical fixes can address many of the water supply problems but often at the expense of creating other



problems. Without any extra housing growth, the region is likely to face a water supply deficit within a few decades. The scale of growth envisaged (500,000 houses) is likely to have serious negative impacts on water resources, biodiversity, tranquillity, air quality and congestion" (East of England Regional Assembly). Perhaps we can ask our MPs and councillors if building three times that number of houses in our region (1,500,000) is a wise, and sane, thing to do.

With reference to biodiversity, Chris Packham's Restore Nature Now march is being held in London on the 22nd June 2024. Environmental organisations such as The National Trust, The Wildlife Trusts, The Climate Coalition (of which the WI is a member), and Surfers Against Sewage will be there. This legal, peaceful, inclusive and family-friendly march aims to be the biggest gathering of people for nature and climate that the UK has ever seen. It is both a celebration of British nature and a protest calling for urgent political action on the climate and ecological / environmental emergency. I've been to a few such marches in the past and am always pleased that I went – they have been uplifting and everyone's so friendly!



TO MOW A MEADOW

So I was enjoying a cup of tea and a lovely sausage roll in the Friendly Space at the Congregational church when Juliet and David told me they had seven lawnmowers at one time! Walking our local public rights of way has become more popular than ever, but with rising spring temperatures leading to rapid vegetation growth following heavy winter rain that caused flooding and deep mud, some of our footpaths and bridleways have become more challenging to use of late. However, just

when you'd hope that the Central Bedfordshire Council Rights of Way team would allocate more resources to remedy these issues, their funding has been cut.

The Council's 2024-5 budget, according to its website "is under huge financial pressure due to substantial increases in costs, particularly in Children's Services and Adult Social Care. Meanwhile, inflation has been running at nearly 10 per cent for a whole year. Faced with a big gap between the council's income, and the cost of services, the council had to make some difficult decisions so it can continue to provide the vital services to support the most vulnerable". The difficulty in providing all the services that people need has manifested itself in various ways with the introduction of the charge for collecting garden waste being one of them.

Recently, I met Michelle Flynn, the CBC footpath officer who covers this area, to discuss the situation. Like her colleagues, she is hoping to recruit teams of volunteers to bridge the funding gap by carrying out some of the smaller and simpler jobs. An example of this is cutting back brambles and branches as well as trimming nettles and other vegetation



that has grown rapidly in the conditions and encroached on the paths. Replacing broken waymark posts is another thing that volunteers can do along with digging gullies and levelling the ground to prevent water accumulating in large puddles.

Some of us have been here before. In the 1990s, we formed Shillington Conservation Volunteers, initially to carry out good deeds for wildlife by enhancing habitats. We set about planting trees, laying hedges, cleaning out ponds that had silted up and clearing bushes from areas where wildflowers were being shaded out.



When the Parish Paths Partnership (P3) was introduced a little later to help people improve the countryside path network, we agreed to join it. Shillington became one of dozens of parishes in the county where it operated and our team was one of the most productive.

We have more field paths than most other parishes in the old county of Bedfordshire and we made them some of the easiest and best to use for miles around. There were several bridges missing at the time but the biggest problem for walkers in Shillington itself was the large number of stiles that stood where footpaths crossed field boundaries.



They were very common and one of the old photographs in the village collection even shows one on the bridleway between Hanscombe End and the church - the Ash Path as older residents might call it - on the bridge where it crosses the brook. At this time, farmers kept far more cattle than now and stiles were the traditional means of preventing them escaping while allowing access for walkers - at least for those who were agile and fit enough to clamber over them. This was also a time before keeping horses for a hobby became popular.



With Bedfordshire County Council (as it was at the time) footing the cost and the agreement of many of the landowners and farmers, our merry band dismantled most of the stiles and installed wooden kissing gates in their place. These opened up routes through the fields for more people including those carrying small children, walking dogs or able to walk but unable to scale the stiles. Since then, keeping cattle has become less

profitable, some of the pastures are ungrazed and some of the kissing gates we put in are now redundant or have been removed. The remainder stop horses from escaping now.

Many of those who joined me on these tasks have moved away or, like me, aged considerably since then. Sadly, a few have passed away. If we want our paths to remain in top condition, we'll need more people to get involved including some of you who may not have done this kind of thing before.

Could you devote a little time to assist? It's good exercise in the open air and fun if you're part of a lively team. You'll get whatever guidance and support you need. If this might be for you, please get in touch with me to discuss how you could get involved and when. With enough support, we can make Shillington's paths great again.



I hope to hear from you soon.



TALKING OF VOLUNTEERING......

One or two village organisations have trustees who have been serving on their committees over many years but, like Derek and me, getting on a bit now and wondering who's going to step up when we step down!! It would be great to get some new, younger, fitter (and more enthusiastic) folk lined up for when such times/life events are finally upon us.

From other articles in this edition, Parish Council is looking to set up CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) – made up of village folk with skills to help out when the community encounters emergencies which need an immediate response. Hopefully local businesses offering suitable support will step up for this one.

We had an amazing response from all sorts of folk in the village with SHILLINGTON HELP when COVID took over our lives – such kind people happy to help out neighbours in trouble. Some of those who stepped up continue to do so.

We continue to have Shillington Care, with kind folk at the end of a phone more than happy to transport people to hospital or doctor's surgery, pick up prescriptions, fill out forms or change a light bulb... all volunteers with little expectation of reward. Most members are of retirement age and of course with a little more time on their hands, but always happy for younger volunteers.

Revd. Angus is running the donations for the Foodbank, making collections and transporting much needed supplies to Bedford on a weekly basis bless him. He won't thank me for saying this but again he's not the spring chicken he once was! Derek is now looking to set up a group to tackle our great footpath network, he can't do this alone – a good opportunity to meet new folk and feel you're doing something useful for the community.

Not normally one for blowing my own trumpet.... being born in Shillington I've been getting stuck in to most things since I was old enough to get involved.....I've been a Parish Councillor for 36 years (retired at last year's local elections); Parish News editor since 1995; serving on both Village Hall and Playing Field Committees for over 40 years (and still am); AND I held down a full time job until I retired at the end of 2017 aged 67.

So none of those excuses "well I've got a full time job so don't have much time".... sit well with me. Currently I'm also involved in co-ordinating Shillingfest and the annual Fireworks but won't be here forever.

I appreciate that younger folk do have families as well as that full time job, and it's a shame we have to wait until retirement before people have more time to 'get involved'.... But...most folk love living here and hope the village and lovely community spirit continue to shine but it can't be left to us 'old fogies' forever. There are plenty of younger folk who would benefit from learning more about the village and all it has to offer.

So this year I'm looking out for volunteers... it's all very well writing about it and sitting back, fingers crossed, hoping folk will step up, but I'll be looking to pounce on likely candidates if spotted hiding in the hedgerows... so be warned! ©



MORE THAN 150 HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT SCHEMES PLANNED ACROSS CENTRAL BEDFORDSHIRE

We have released our Highways Annual Plan for 2024/25 featuring over 150 improvement schemes throughout Central Bedfordshire.

The schemes include road surfacing enhancements, pavement maintenance, drainage schemes, street lighting upgrades, and bridge works. More than 50 schemes relate to road safety improvements, including speed reduction, traffic calming measures, and the provision of disabled parking bays. Additionally, there are 17 schemes relating to rights of way improvements.





To ensure that resource is being allocated in the right place, we use a data-led approach. This involves assessing the condition of roads, pavements and other highways assets, their repair history, the types of road, and the local infrastructure it supports such as emergency services, critical utilities, public transport facilities, education providers, and employment hubs. As well as carrying out the planned schemes, we'll continue to carry out reactive repairs for issues reported via Fix My Street or identified through our regular inspection routes. In 2023/24, we repaired over 2,000 potholes, cleaned 23,000 gullies, and fixed more than 1,000 streetlights.

Annual highways plan for Central Bedfordshire

We maintain a vast network of road, over 1,400km in total, together with a large footway network. In addition to this, our highways team maintains over 220 bridges and structures, 23,000 streetlights, pedestrian crossings, drainage, traffic lights and signs along the road network. Our team also manages improvement schemes including speed limits, traffic calming measures and parking services. We also look after other public rights of way, such as footpaths and bridleways.

Our annual plan shows the numerous highways schemes we intend to implement between 2024 and 2025 including:

- structural maintenance
- drainage
- street lighting
- major schemes such as new roads
- bridges and structures

SHILLINGTON CHILDMINDERS

Childminders provide safe, friendly home environments for children to play and have fun whilst gently learning through their play. We take children on outings to farms, play centres, splash parks, museums and libraries, as well as teach them life skills such as helping to do shopping, gardening and cooking.

We are individually registered to Ofsted, have public liability insurance, follow the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum, undertake regular training including Safeguarding and First Aid and receive regular newsletters and bulletins from professional organisations.

We provide the children with opportunities to learn social skills and experience different play resources at baby/toddler groups and other settings. We are able to cover holidays and other absences for each other where possible.

Some of us are able to provide up to 15 hours of free childcare a week for eligible 2 year olds, as soon as care starts, in the same way that nurseries and pre-schools can. We are also able to provide the free sessions for all 3 and 4 year olds; at least 15 hours per week or up to 30 hours per week (for 38 weeks of the year) depending on parental eligibility and the childminder's policy. The free sessions normally start the term after the child's 3rd birthday. There may be additional charges to cover e.g. food and outings.

We each have differing childcare availability such as before and after school care, daytime childcare, overnight childcare, ad-hoc care or flexible care e.g. for shift workers.


