#### **PARISH COUNCIL**

September's Parish council meeting was a long one with lots of admin after the summer break.

Firstly a big thank you and congratulations to Blake Stephenson our new MP. He will be stepping down from the Parish council to concentrate on his role in Parliament and at Ward Member level, but will provide a monthly report to the PC and meet quarterly with the Chair.

The AGAR (Annual Governance and Accountability Review) was accepted and approved. Well done to Lauren our clerk, (this was her first AGAR), the external auditor was very impressed, finding only 1 minor admin error.

The remainder of the earmarked funds were approved to send to the Village Hall to help with further upgrade work.

Local maintenance tenders were discussed with further information and discussion for October's meeting.

Annual reports for the Shillington car park charity and War Memorial charity were detailed and approved.

We agreed to request a road closure for Remembrance Sunday which, subsequently after a lot of paperwork, has been approved.

We continue to chase the multiple outstanding Highways and Footpath issues with CBC and add more frequently. It is very frustrating but we will not give up.

Future Road closures notified by Central Bedfordshire Council:

- Clophill Road, Gravenhurst. Carriageway patching. From A507 to High Street. The closure will be in place 7th October 2024 from 0900-1530hrs.
- Church Street/Hillfoot Road, Shillington. Pre-surface dressing/surface dressing. Lining. Length affected: Church Street full length and Hillfoot Road junction with Church Street. The closure will be in place from 0800hrs to 1800hrs from 7th October to 18<sup>th</sup> October 2024.
- Greenfields, Shillington. Mastic asphalt patching works. The closure will be in place from 30th to 31st October from 0900-1530hrs.
- Stondon Road, Shillington, Carriageway repair works. Length affected: on bend near Marquis Hill. The closure will be in place from 25th to 29th November from 0900-1530hrs.

Reports from the police traffic management unit for Hanscombe End and Pegsdon were received and added to the hefty weight of data from previous TMU work and the great volunteers from Speedwatch. Working with our Ward Member, and now our MP, Blake Stephenson we are hoping CBC highways will do something to slow cars in the village. Street watch continued its bi-weekly patrols with nothing serious to report.

Community Emergency Response Teams were discussed again with CBC advising that the first step is to set up a WhatsApp group for volunteers. Previous requests for volunteers have been rather disappointing, so we hope to rectify this given recent flooding and the threat of these sort of events becoming more frequent.

Pegsdon now has a Defibrillator located outside The View pub. Thank you to Claire Harvey and Pegsdon residents for organising; the pub owners for allowing it to be situated on their building; and to all the donors who funded it. The PC will maintain it going forward with the help of residents' regular checks.

We had lots of correspondence to consider and add to the next agenda, including S106 usage, highways issues, litter schemes, street lights and improved sports facilities.

#### Qualifications to be a Councillor

To stand as Councillor, on the day of nomination or election, you must be 18 or over and a UK, EU or Commonwealth Citizen, and

- either be registered to vote on the current register with the local council
- or have either worked or lived in the council's area for one year
- been an owner or tenant of any land or premises in the council's area for one year.

#### You cannot stand if:

- you work for your local council, or
- you hold a politically restricted post for another authority, or
- you are the subject of a bankruptcy restrictions order or interim order, or
- you have served a prison sentence (including suspended sentences) of three months or more within five years prior to the election, or
- you have been disqualified under any legislation relating to corrupt or illegal practices.

You do not need any formal qualifications to become a councillor.

#### **RIVER ACTION MARCH**

You can't beat swimming in a freezing cold pool at the base of a lovely little waterfall. I can feel you shudder from here but, honestly, you really can't beat it!



Until a few years ago, I was very happy just removing my shoes and socks and wriggling my toes in streams or pools of cool water. Going the extra step was down to my daughter. After walking for a couple of hours across the beautiful remote Northumberland countryside, we came across a gorgeous waterfall. My daughter promptly

striped off to her underwear and went into the pool. My comments about hypothermia, and the possibly of a dead sheep in the water upstream, fell on deaf ears. I was told to stop being an old wuss and to get on in as "the water's lovely.... it is *freezing*". I wasn't prepared to be a wuss, especially an old one, so after some advice about concentrating on slow deep breathing and making steady calm movements, I put thoughts of having a heart attack to one side and slipped into the pool of clear moving water. It was wonderful. I was hooked.

I have always loved swimming in the sea but news about the appalling amount of raw sewage being legally and illegally released into our streams, rivers and seas has made me think twice about doing this. It's unbelievable that this has been allowed to happen purely to keep shareholders happy. I feel immensely sad that something else special has been taken away from me – and all because of a sickening need for extreme wealth by a relatively small number of uncaring people.

A couple of months ago, I received an email about a 'March for Clean Water' that will take place in London on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2024. It is being organised by River Action and Feargal Sharkey, a chalk stream campaigner. It is supported by over sixty organisations including the WI, the National Trust, Surfers Against Sewage, The Rivers Trust and the Soil Association and an increasing number of famous faces.



Please would you consider joining this legal and peaceful march as "together we will send a clear message to the Government that it's their job to stop the poisoning of our waterways" (River Action). As the CEO of the Wildlife Trusts put it last year: "The state of many of our water courses is a national disgrace.

Our rivers should be the crown jewels of our natural environment but a lais-sez-faire approach to pollution – allowing rivers to be filled with animal and human waste – means many are facing ecological collapse. We should be swimming in our rivers and watching spectacular wildlife, not standing on river banks gazing in sorrow at algal blooms and dead fish".

We very much need to show Government how upset and angry we are about the unacceptable state of our streams, rivers, lakes and seas. River Action is asking that we march to demand that the new Government tackles the freshwater emergency, enforces the law and delivers new legislation to restore our waterways to full health by 2030.

I have put Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> November in my diary – I'm definitely going. It would be great if you and your family and friends could go as well! It promises to be an interesting, uplifting and inspiring day out. The march will bring people together and it feels good doing something positive.


# HOLDING ON...... TO OUR PRECIOUS CHURCH ON THE HILL

#### The Quinquennial Inspection

Every five years, the whole of the Church, inside and out, receives a thorough inspection by an architect. As well as the things we know need attention, the QI always brings to light some additional work which needs doing. The work is broken down into jobs which require immediate attention, those needing attention within 2 years and things to be assessed before the next QI (in 2029!)

We are still processing the (57 page) report and will be working with the Parochial Church Council to prioritise the jobs and work up a project plan to tackle them.

AND, if that were not enough, we do know that the roof will require some attention in order to keep the weather out! We don't know the scale of the problem yet, but, what we do know is that we will, as never before, need the help, support and generosity of the Friends membership and of the village community.

Extreme heat, winds and too much or too little rainfall used to be something that only happened and caused problems in other places, usually in faraway lands. It's getting closer to home though now. Greece and Portugal suffered terrible wildfires after severe heat, drought and gales combined earlier this year. Unprecedented

flooding in central Europe during September caused enormous damage and killed at least 24 people. With near 40 degree temperatures in the summer of 2022 and the recent run of nose to tail thunderstorms that dumped more than a month's worth of rain in 24 hours, it seems that it's reached Shillington too. Such conditions can make a big impact on lives. The heat two summers ago was debilitating. For those who were flooded and whose havens of security suddenly became less 'homely', I offer my utmost sympathy. It's good to hear that many people rallied round to help their less fortunate neighbours.

Although the damage can be repaired and life will return to normal, there are likely to be lasting effects, with the cost of some foods set to rise. The more variable weather this year has reduced yields of cereals and the total harvest is likely to be down by at least a quarter overall in the UK. Brace yourselves for the price of flour and bread to increase soon. The recent downpours may affect next year's crops too as farmers have planted many already. Locally, most fields have drains that quickly remove excessive water but like much of the country's infrastructure, many of them are getting extremely old. When they get blocked and water pools, soggy seed will rot before it has a chance to sprout and will produce nothing.



Of course, no individual event can be pinned on the climate crisis with certainty but more severe and frequent heatwaves, droughts, floods and severe gales are symptoms of global warming caused by releasing more carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Scientists noticed long ago that average world temperatures have been rising since this country

started to industrialise in the 1700s and burned more and more coal. Consumption of oil and gas has shot up during the last century and is contributing too. Since the 1970s, the experts have become increasingly concerned about the clear link between fossil fuel use and rising global temperatures. They have calculated that when the atmosphere becomes one degree celsius warmer, it holds 7% more water. It may not sound like a lot and we would cope if it increased rainfall evenly across the globe. However, it becomes concentrated in certain places where it leads to flooding. It's clear that the more we fill the atmosphere with fossil fuel emissions, the worse the situation will become.

In theory, we can adapt to climate change. It is obvious that new homes must not be built where flooding may occur. It is possible to make existing ones better insulated and more flood-proof- at a cost. When looking for solutions, we have to beware of unintended consequences though. Increasing the size of the drains and the brook to take water away faster sounds like a good idea but will lead to flooding further downstream.

Making better use of the natural floodplain along the river to store water would help but affect agricultural land and horse paddocks.

Adaption to climate breakdown in not sufficient though - we need to slow it down and reverse it as soon as possible. There is no excuse for not taking it into account in our everyday lives. While many of us make an effort to reduce our personal CO2 emissions by forgoing air travel, reusing and recycling things, eating less meat and so on, others continue to act as though everything was fine. Politicians have been slow to act too. Oil and gas companies have lobbied MPs heavily in the past to get them to reject measures that would damage their business models. If they attempt to influence our new MP, I trust that he will ignore them, let us know about it and support all measures that parliament takes to combat climate change.

#### Path maintenance progress



Volunteers from the village turned out in force in August when we tackled heavy vegetation growth along footpath 23. This runs from Upton End Rd through to Marshalls Avenue and Wilson Close and is a key link in the path network as another path connects it to the playing field. I started off with low expectations about how much we'd get done but with 11 people armed with loppers, shears and secateurs turning up, we finished the job in one session. Thanks very much to everyone involved.

Our work will continue into the autumn as there is plenty more to do. The path off Hanscombe End Road that heads towards Hexton and links to Apsley End is next on the list. #### SHILLINGTON CHILDMINDERS

Childminders provide safe, friendly home environments for children to play and have fun whilst gently learning through their play. We take children on outings to farms, play centres, splash parks, museums and libraries, as well as teach them life skills such as helping to do shopping, gardening and cooking.

We are individually registered to Ofsted, have public liability insurance, follow the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum, undertake regular training including Safeguarding and First Aid and receive regular newsletters and bulletins from professional organisations.

We provide the children with opportunities to learn social skills and experience different play resources at baby/toddler groups and other settings. We are able to cover holidays and other absences for each other where possible.

Some of us are able to provide up to 15 hours of free childcare a week for eligible 2 year olds, as soon as care starts, in the same way that nurseries and pre-schools can. We are also able to provide the free sessions for all 3 and 4 year olds; at least 15 hours per week or up to 30 hours per week (for 38 weeks of the year) depending on parental eligibility and the childminder's policy. The free sessions normally start the term after the child's 3rd birthday. There may be additional charges to cover e.g. food and outings.

We each have differing childcare availability such as before and after school care, daytime childcare, overnight childcare, ad-hoc care or flexible care e.g. for shift workers.



#### **AUTUMN DAYS**

October is a lovely month with the soft autumnal light and the hedgerows abundant with berries and seed heads for the birds to feast on. There is a nip to the air in the mornings and the turning leaves bring a richness of colour to the shortening days.

This time of year you can still add colour and form to your garden and it's now that Prairie style gardens really come into their own. Prairie means Grassland and is associated with the prairies of the American Midwest.

Prairie gardens combine ornamental grasses and perennials in naturalised drifts for a relaxed style of planting. The Garden Designer Puet Oudolf made this popular with his intricate planting plans.

Using the Matrix Planting technique where you use a handful of species that dominates the planting. Forming a backbone in which the other plants are blended. It is great for wildlife providing nectar and pollen and seed heads for the birds.

Plants that work well in this style are Asters, Echinacea, Japanese Anenomes, Crocrosmia, Verbascum, Echinops, Alliums and knautia combined with Ornamental grasses.

Another way to add colour and interest at this time of year would be adding a tree to the garden. The stars of the show being Acers with their variety of stunning shades. Cotinus the Smoke Bush, Forest Pansy and Amelankier lamarkii - all these trees are quite compact so you could plant them in smaller gardens to add height and interest.

# ONE THOUSAND MEN ARE WALKING By Joshua Dyer in 2019 (aged 14)


One thousand men are walking, walking side by side
