PARISH COUNCIL

The ordinary meeting in December began by hearing that Tracey Petrie had resigned from the council. We thank Tracey for the 12 years that she has devoted to being a councillor. The process to appoint a replacement has begun and we invite anyone interested to contact the Parish Clerk.

Councillors heard that Lauren Darnell, Clerk to the Parish Council, had successfully completed her CILCA training and offered their congratulations. She will now begin the follow-up FILCA course.

The council heard that Grand Union Housing had experienced high staff turnover recently and their records of previous correspondence regarding parking and the state of the verges in Greenfields had been lost. Subsequent to the meeting, the Chairman discovered that Grand Union has merged with another housing provider and is now known as Amplius. He arranged to meet a representative and brought to their attention the potential for improving parking on stabilised grassed areas and in front gardens, safety issues for residents, school traffic and completion of the tarmacing between Hillfoot Rd (White City) and Jepps Close.

Councillor Gavin Jenkins reported that Central Bedfordshire Council had awarded the Playing Fields Committee a grant of £18,000 towards further improvements at the Sports and Social Club. The clerk announced that she had received the Section 106 re-imbursement towards the cost of the new path at the playing field. She also reminded councillors that a further £1205.56 of funding was available but not yet allocated and would need to be used by 23/11/2025. One suggestion was that this might be put towards developing a community garden. A resident had kindly offered a potential area off Hanscombe End Road but councillors were keen to explore the availability of other sites more centrally placed. Members of the council's environment committee had begun an audit of existing sites around the village that were important for plants and wildlife.

Councillors heard that it would cost £1,785 to replace the street light in Church Street that had been taken down for safety reasons as the column was badly corroded. With other streetlights situated nearby and the street lighting budget for the year already substantially overspent, some councillors were keen to check whether it was really necessary. After the meeting, they visited the area and at the Finance meeting the following week, they agreed that it should be replaced.

At this meeting, it was revealed that there was also an overspend in the General Administration budget with time spent by the Clerk on training being a contributory factor. When fixing the precept for 2025/2026, councillors also took into account that many of the contracts up for renewal would cost considerably more than before. Because alterations to the mowing regime on highway verges would push up the cost, councillors decided to postpone making changes for the time being. At the January meeting, they agreed an increase in the precept from £41,100 to £49,235, which would result in owners of properties in Band D for Council Tax paying £9.24 more during the next financial year.

The Police & Crime Commissioner for Bedfordshire, John Tizard, also attended the January meeting. His priorities would be to prevent crime taking place, tackling serious crime, local policing and protecting women and children. He pledged to keep in touch with local councillors and would meet regularly to liaise with our MP to discuss pertinent issues such as community policing, speeding and police funding.

Central Bedfordshire Councillor Blake Stephenson was unable to attend any meetings but submitted written reports. He warned that the CBC budget was under severe pressure and would require making difficult decisions regarding service provision, staffing and Council Tax.

As Parish News was about to be published, Anglia Water confirmed that the remainder of the water main renewal towards Pegsdon would continue this year. The stretch along Hanscombe End Road may begin as early as 14 April and be completed by 31 October. The work will take place in five phases and the road will not be closed for all of this period. We shall no doubt get further details soon. The length along Apsley End Rd will be replaced between 3 November and 8 May next year. When completed, supplies of water to Pegsdon will be more reliable than in recent years when interruptions have occurred on several occasions.

Qualifications to be a Councillor

To stand as Councillor, on the day of nomination or election, you must be 18 or over and a UK, EU or Commonwealth Citizen, and

- either be registered to vote on the current register with the local council
- or have either worked or lived in the council's area for one year
- been an owner or tenant of any land or premises in the council's area for one year.

You cannot stand if:

- you work for your local council, or
- you hold a politically restricted post for another authority, or
- you are the subject of a bankruptcy restrictions order or interim order, or
- you have served a prison sentence (including suspended sentences) of three months or more within five years prior to the election, or
- you have been disqualified under any legislation relating to corrupt or illegal practices.

You do not need any formal qualifications to become a councillor.

Yes people will reveal that they have met a famous person. It may be a member of a royal family or an Olympic champion. It may be that they shook hands with a pop singer. You might have a picture of someone who achieved high public office or achieved an amazing goal such as rowing across the Atlantic Ocean.

I know there are people who collect all kinds of items with a connection to a famous person; stamps or autographs for example; Toby jugs and miniatures of famous or historic people. The list goes on especially in quizzes to ask where someone famous was born or died even.

So many famous people seem to have gone to live far away from their roots; others want to go to their roots and a story is created for us to be amazed. It is usually some wee

remote village in some far away place. Anyhow, for me, my list might be quite small and probably contain names many would not recognise. I did collect stamps as a youngster with faces of many heads of state around the world at the time. It mainly helped me discover where various countries were in the world.

see what influences were at play around him and decide where there was only folly to listen to them.

Of course, many of us really discover what this sense of an important person is for ourselves in a time of crisis when help comes our way. We can be that person for another and you will be famous as well to each other if not to anyone else.

There is an opportunity for everyone to be important to everyone else where they live and work and play.

May that place be here and now for all of us.

OUR INTELLIGENCE IS BEING INSULTED!

In the quieter days after the New Year, I actually got around to reading something that I'd been meaning to read since it was released on the 12th December 2024. It has eighty-two pages and it was hard going. You may be thinking, from the number of pages, that it's a Short Story of some kind but no, it's not – and I can safely say that it certainly wouldn't come under the literary genre of 'Romance'. If anything, it would come under the ones of 'Horror', 'Crime' and 'Psychological Thriller' (or 'Killer').

The publication I read was the government's updated National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). It's taken eighty odd pages and around thirty thousand words to tell us that developers are going to build what they want, where they want and that economic growth is so much more important than nature (the thing that gives us life). Gosh, all that time, effort and money (ours) trying to deceive us when they could have been open and honest and said what they plan to do in about twenty words. "Tricks and treachery are the practice of fools that don't have brains enough to be honest" (Benjamin Franklin 1706 – 1790) and "Some liars are so expert they deceive themselves" (Austin O'Malley 1858 – 1932). I do like a good quote.



The NPPF says National Parks, The Broads and National Landscapes "have the highest status of protection". It goes on to state that: "The scale and extent of development within all these designated areas should be limited" (Page 54). So, it's basically telling us that our precious National Parks etc are highly protected from development but can be built on. According to the NPPF,

planning permission in these areas, and SSSIs, "should be refused for major development other than in exceptional circumstances, and where it can be demonstrated that the development is in the public interest" (Page 55). Give developers an inch and they'll take a mile. The word "limited" is that inch; adding the words "should" and "in exceptional circumstances" gives these uncaring, self-centred and self-serving people more than a mile.



The NPPF is a masterclass in deception, manipulation and control. It tells us that "Planning policies and decisions should contribute to and enhance the natural environment by: a) protecting and enhancing valued landscapes, sites of biodiversity or geological value and soils" (Page 54). 'Protect' means "shield"

from danger, injury, change, capture, loss" (Chambers Dictionary). Going onto a greenfield site with a ruddy great digger and removing the fragile topsoil (N.B. a new study reveals that around 50% of the planet's biodiversity is in soils) is not protecting it; it is destroying it ('loss'). To then go and pour tons of concrete on the site is blatantly obviously going to totally alter it ('change').

Each and every greenfield site is of immense landscape, biodiversity and geological value - these three are all interlinked (the type of rock and soil in an area determines not only the types of plants and animals that live there but also the landscape). RAMBLING ON with DEREK TURNER

1911 was a very dry year with a heatwave between July and September. On 6 May, George V was crowned king with the coronation taking place on 22 June. For Shillington where usually, nothing much happened, it was quite a year too. The Musgrave family had owned Shillington Manor house in Apsley End since 1671 but in 1911, they sold it to Captain Lucas of the Hitchin brewing family. At the other end of the village, Shillington Bury had been home to the Manor of Shillington which had existed in 1034 and possibly earlier. The Hanscombe family which had long had links with the village acquired the Bury in the middle of the nineteenth century. In the decades that followed, the manorial system declined in importance and William Hanscombe would be the last lord of the Manor of Shillington. After his death, his family donated land for a village hall and the Hanscombe Memorial Hall would open on 11 December 1911.



For centuries, public meetings had been held outside, often at a prominent landmark such as a distinctive hill or under a large tree. Later, they might take place in public houses and this continued until purposebuilt halls became available. When the congregation of the Wesleyan Methodist Chapel at 31 Church Street outgrew the building leading to the

construction in 1872 of its much larger replacement in High Road (next to the shop), the Liberal Party purchased the redundant building. The party was well-supported in Shillington at this time but when they were not using it, they hired it out and it soon had many customers. I speculate that there were others in the village who were not keen to use the Liberal Hall and boost the coffers of the Liberal Party and it's possible that they wanted to have an alternative meeting place available. Whatever, our village hall was one of the earlier ones to be built in 1911. Others without a wealthy benefactor would have to wait until after 1920 when charitable support for village halls became available.

There are pictures of Hanscombe Memorial Hall that were taken soon after its opening in the collection of old village photographs. The main structure looks very much as it does now although the top of the chimney was removed after the solid fuel heating was replaced. The flat-roofed



extensions that now house the lobby, kitchen, toilets and Jubilee Room are missing - they were all added much later. However, there was a small lean-to at the back that probably housed bucket toilets. The most striking feature though was a large hooded semi-circular canopy supported by huge consoles at the front. It must have protruded at least a yard (0.9m) from the front of the building and been twice that in width to span the double doors. Andy Gibbs has begun to publish the old photographs online https://www.flickr.com/photos/199681506@N08/albums and although the village hall exterior doesn't show up in any of them so far, I expect it won't be long before it does.

A committee was set up to run the hall and a treasurer appointed to deal with the finances. I've been scrutinising the accounts book that they kept which lists income and expenditure during much of its first 50 years.

The earliest entries reveal a steady stream of donations from local people in the run-up to its opening.

They reflect the inequalities in society with some people putting in a shilling (5 pence in today's currency but worth £4 or so at the time) while Mrs. Hanscombe, William's widow, contributed a further 100 guineas (£105). There was £75 each from James Simkins and G.H. Ruffel and £50 from Doctor Kilham Roberts. Over £567 would be raised by the time it opened.

As the hall neared completion, the first expenditure for fitting it out is listed - £12 for lamps, £3 for the all-important urns and spoons, £8 for crockery and £3 for cupboards. Among those that followed was £27 for 102 chairs, £20 for a grand piano (which was tuned 3 months later for 5 shillings), and In November, just over £1 for fire insurance. Shortly before the opening, an unnamed cleaner received 4 shillings and sixpence for their effort. It may have been Miss Jepps as later entries show that she was employed to do that job.



Within a week of opening, a jumble sale took place raising a massive £42. The first whist drive on 19 January 1912 raised £5. These events were both popular and became regular money spinners. By March, the hall had some card tables. Gradually concerts and other unspecified entertainment took place along with bible meetings, hires for private parties and an annual meeting of the cricket club. However, visiting the

hall must have been a chilly experience for its earliest users and in June 1912, a Nautilus cast iron grate was installed for £10 to heat the building. Bookings were fairly sparse, rarely more than 4 times a month with none at all in August.

The early accounts can be frustrating to interpret. They sometimes record the payer/payee and sometimes the item purchased or what the hall was hired for but not always both. Payments for unspecified items were made to Thomas Prutton who ran the shop and drapers at 1 Hillfoot Road and to Hitchin businesses Paternoster and Hales (printers), Gatwards (ironmongers, now jewellers), Carling (printers and publisher of a local newspaper) and Thomas Brookers and Sons who sold a range of hardware and equipment for homes and businesses as they do to this day. In September 1913, the hall paid 10 shillings (50p) for a stage license, compulsory at the time but probably something that had slipped the collective minds of the committee until then.

In 1914, war broke out and use of the hall gradually declined. Intriguingly, in March 1916, a payment was received 'from military authorities for damage done'. I'm not aware that 'the military authorities' requisitioned village halls at this time but if you know differently, please let me know. Shortly afterwards, the records ceased altogether. Maybe the Treasurer had been called up to fight? Suddenly, the accounts resumed in January 1920 and the entries continued as if nothing had happened.

I still have a lot of the book to plough through and I'll continue this history of the village hall as seen through its accounts on another occasion.

PEGSDON VIEW



We've been quite busy here in Pegsdon since the last edition. In December the council carried out another speed survey on the B655, we're awaiting the results. I'm expecting to see some differences, the weather in early December would've had a dampening effect on the speed of travel on the road, for which I am grateful, and is not necessarily a good indication of traffic speed at other times of year. It will be interesting to be able to compare with the results of

previous surveys too. We expect the results in the next month or two.

We've had a Speedwatch site approved in the village and are signing up volunteers this month. Next step is to receive the handbook and have some training, then we will be ready for Speedwatch exercises. Thanks to Richa and the Parish Council for their support and hard work on this.

We had volunteers from the ambulance service provide training mid-January, focusing on recognising a heart attack vs a cardiac arrest and how to use our new defibrillator. Hosted by The View and well attended. Thanks to Claire for organising and Lainey for hosting.

We were also delighted to see the news from Anglian Water about the mains renewal work approval. Once complete this should completely resolve the water supply issues we've suffered from for so many years now, such good news. Thanks to Steve, the Parish Council and the team at Anglian Water for pursuing this.

In other news, the highland cattle have returned to the Pegsdon Hills, it's been lovely to see them again.

SHILLINGTON CHILDMINDERS

Childminders provide safe, friendly home environments for children to play and have fun whilst gently learning through their play. We take children on outings to farms, play centres, splash parks, museums and libraries, as well as teach them life skills such as helping to do shopping, gardening and cooking.

We are individually registered to Ofsted, have public liability insurance, follow the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum, undertake regular training including Safeguarding and First Aid and receive regular newsletters and bulletins from professional organisations.

We provide the children with opportunities to learn social skills and experience different play resources at baby/toddler groups and other settings. We are able to cover holidays and other absences for each other where possible.

Some of us are able to provide up to 15 hours of free childcare a week for eligible 2 year olds, as soon as care starts, in the same way that nurseries and pre-schools can. We are also able to provide the free sessions for all 3 and 4 year olds; at least 15 hours per week or up to 30 hours per week (for 38 weeks of the year) depending on parental eligibility and the childminder's policy. The free sessions normally start the term after the child's 3rd birthday. There may be additional charges to cover e.g. food and outings.

We each have differing childcare availability such as before and after school care, daytime childcare, overnight childcare, ad-hoc care or flexible care e.g. for shift workers.


But this is just the beginning! The CBC fund was granted to help complete a first phase of essential structural works. The second phase will be to improve the accessibility and facilities of the Social Club, making it an even more usable and enjoyable space for the whole community.

Phase two will include new fully accessible toilet facilities, wider and more accessible points of entry and exit, a major refurbishment of the bar and seating areas and even a local history display.

As well as the CBC grant, the project is receiving support from the Parish Council, The Memorial Playing Field Committee, the Wixamtree Trust and the prodigious fundraising activities of the Social Club Management Team. We are also planning a funding application to the Heritage Lottery Fund, who are always keen to ensure that local assets and local heritage are fully shared with the local community.

DOG FOULING



It is YOUR responsibility as a dog owner to ensure YOU clean up after YOUR dog.

Shillington Parish has 22+ dog bins for you to make use of, or poo bags can be taken home to place in the black dustbin - no excuse for not being a responsible dog owner.

Several very annoyed property owners, who are having to daily clean up dog poo on their property will now be keeping a close watch and will not hesitate to report continued lack of responsibility.

Central Bedfordshire Council can fine you £100 if you allow a dog, for which you are responsible, to foul and not clear it up immediately when in a public place. Public places include:

- footways and paths, including public footpaths
- play areas, picnic sites and outdoor eating places
- sports playing pitches
- formal parks and land where the grass is cut
- · land outside schools and hospitals
- · car parks, public transport bays and surrounds
- cycle ways and surfaced areas near to houses
- shopping areas, markets and public circulation areas
- cemeteries and war memorials
- land surrounding toilets, recycling sites and public buildings

If you are in control of a dog, you must (**by law**) pick up dog mess on any land with public access including:

- town centres
- roads
- pavements
- · public footpaths
- woodlands
- · agricultural land
- common land



From 6 January 2025, we have introduced the following changes at our Household Waste Recycling Centres, or Tidy Tips as they're better known:

- ➤ Carpet (including underlay) disposal: Disposal is limited to 2 visits per household per year. You will need to have a waste permit which is free to apply for
- Mattress disposal: Disposal is limited to two mattresses per household per year.
 You will need to have a waste permit which is free to apply for
- > **Tyre disposal:** A charge of £11.30 per tyre will apply.
 For the disposal of any tyres, you will need to have a waste permit

Tyres are not classified as household waste and there's a cost to us to dispose of them – which is passed on to all Council taxpayers.

Limiting the amount of carpets, mattresses and tyres we accept at our Tidy Tips per household will also help reduce the amount of waste sent to landfill - again, a large cost to us and Council taxpayers.
