PARISH COUNCIL

We are pleased to report that the vacancy for a parish councillor has now been filled. Shelby Long came forward at the May meeting and the existing councillors voted to co-opt her. As she is considerably younger than many of the others, we look forward to hearing her perspective on topics we discuss in future. John Hyde was re-appointed as chair of the meetings and Richa Mitra takes over as vice-chair for the coming year. Parish councillor representatives on village management committees are John Hyde and Mark Thyne for the Playing Fields, Joe Olding for the Village Hall and John Hyde, Annie Palmer, Richa Mitra and Shelby Long for the Risk Management Working Party.

At the April meeting, the problem of loose stones spilling onto the road from a driveway was mentioned. The parish council urges residents to check for this and sweep it back regularly and also to trim their hedges before they obstruct pavements or roads and inconvenience others. Councillors are aware that children are unlawfully using e-bikes in public places such as the playing field and on pavements. Parents are urged to stop this before someone is injured. E-bikes should be used only on land without public access and with the permission of the landowner. A little consideration for the needs of others is essential in a friendly village like ours where many short journeys are made on foot.

With strong gusts of wind toppling the christmas trees erected in the War Memorial grounds in recent years, councillors approved the Christmas Tree Committee's suggestion to install a below-ground housing to provide better support. This will be covered over at other times of year for the safety of visitors.

In his written report, Central Bedfordshire Councillor, Blake Stephenson confirmed that the Ward Councillor Grant Scheme will continue to be available this year to help local organisations needing funds to meet their aspirations. The Parish Council also reserves some of its budget each year to assist village groups and has awarded £63.47 to Shillington Volunteer Litter Pickers.

Local authorities including Central Bedfordshire Council periodically carry out a Community Governance Review to check that parish and ward boundaries are suited to the number of electors within them. The parish council felt that there was no need to alter the current arrangement where it has 10 councillors or change the ward boundary where our CBC councillor represents Shillington and Meppershall.

Councillors voted to oppose a recent planning application, CB/24/01379, for new houses on land next to Dawes garage. This site was approved for the construction of 18 houses in the last Local Plan but the developers are now seeking to build just nine and these would be four or five bedroom properties. Not only does this mean that there would be no affordable housing to meet local need but the developers would also avoid the obligation to pay for any community benefits such as traffic calming on nearby High Road. There was also concern that the visibility splay where the new entrance road meets High Road would be inadequate.

Just before the *Parish News* deadline and to inform the compilation of the next Local Plan, Central Bedfordshire Council published the list of 626 sites that developers, landowners and others have submitted as possible places for new homes and jobs, renewable energy generation and green spaces suitable for Biodiversity Net Gain. Eight of these are in Shillington parish with five of them off Upton End Road. The Parish Council will take a close look at these and submit our views to CBC as soon as the opportunity arises. Please note that the list is arranged by ward boundaries, so look us up under Meppershall and Shillington. The Annual Meeting of the Parish was held a week after the May PC meeting and we were pleased to see an excellent turnout. Many thanks to everyone who attended. They were treated to an entertaining talk by farmer, Whizz Middleton, and reports from many village organisations. A full account appears as a separate insert within this magazine.

We look forward to seeing you.



So way back when I was a wee lad in Belfast and maybe you were much the same age if you are reading this, I remember the loud sound of the Shipyard horns signalling the end of the working day. Then hundreds of bicycles came down the street from the Shipyard to a junction near my house. The workers were of all ages and the bikes looked well used but certainly not of the racing type.

There was also another loud noise slightly later coming from the end of another street. It was from a spinning mill which was a very plain and dusty building. As youngsters we would creep into the building which, for some reason, seemed to have the doors wide open. Inside were the dusty bales and the complicated looking machinery that we could hear at times. Never saw anyone and we soon ran out again.



Not far away were the docks where so many ships came and went and sometimes newly built ships berthed briefly like the Canberra. There would be occasional loud horns sounding off. Smoke as well from some of the ships. There were nightly sailings to Liverpool and some went to Ardrossan and Douglas and other places. On Sundays it was so quiet apart

from the bells of St Patrick's parish church.

So these sounds were connected to places of work and worship and the week was a regular routine of these sounds. Nowadays it is usually the sound of emergency vehicles or someone sounding off their car horn and of course maybe a helicopter.

Recently I was being driven by someone who suggested two horns in his vehicle might be useful. He wanted a gentle sounding horn to warn when necessary. He also thought he could use a specially loud horn to express a sense of anger or annoyance at appropriate times.

Well indeed if we're honest many of us drivers would probably agree with the usefulness of having two such horns. Not sure if it would make any difference to the situation we were reacting to but it would help us feel we could let off some steam.



The two horns idea makes me think of how road signs vary from LARGE letters with SLOW and 30 to smaller writing that says a lot about a road closure that I can never read until I've passed it. Not sure about stopping to read it either or is it possible to do a round trip several times until I have read it all!

Anyway back to horns. I've heard horns that have special tunes being played on them and I wondered what tune I would like to have on my horn. Maybe 'Jingle Bells' but all the year round? The ice cream vehicle often has a variety of tunes. I have come to the conclusion that I like SILENCE most of all.

Enjoy the birds and bees in their seasons.

WHAT'S GOING ON?

I've always been interested in old sayings and often wonder how they came about. It's a shame that many seem to be disappearing. "Luv-a-Duck!" is one that comes to mind. The idiom "to blow your top" isn't used much nowadays either, but it's one I can relate to at the moment. If somebody else tells me to give up trying to save the countryside (nature) from government and developers because we are powerless against them, I'm likely to erupt. That is giving in and, to use Sir David Attenborough's words, I have a "responsibility" not to do that. We all do.

I cannot get my head round the way we are being blatantly deceived/lied to by those in power yet are unable to do anything about it. I can't work out, or understand, how their brains work – being a psychologist isn't in my remit. Maybe it would help if it was.



Many of the things that government and developers are saying and then doing are irrational and insane. For instance, they tell us that "Nature is dying" yet carry on doing the thing that is destroying it (Build, Build, Build). As we can't live without nature, anyone with more than two brain cells would immediately stop doing the thing that's killing it, but not these people. They

say we are in "one of the most water stressed areas in the country" yet insist that 1,000,000 houses are built here. They inform us that East of England is the country's arable heartland with "large areas of the highest quality agricultural land". It contributes significantly to UK crop production. It is unbelievable that they intend to cover a huge percentage of this resource, that is of vital importance to us, with tarmac and concrete – we can't grow food on that. What exactly is going on in their heads?

Government and developers are telling us that nature, water and soils are vitally important to us all that that we're losing them at an unprecedented rate. Are they telling us so that, in the not-so-distant future when things go horribly pear-shaped, they can say: "We told you so"? They'll say that it was the general population who demanded they built all the houses, not them. It's about putting the blame solely on us rather than on themselves — it's our fault, not theirs. The powers that be know how to use words and are the ultimate brainwashers. Have I hit the nail on the head or am I barking up the wrong tree?

Regarding the housing crisis, developers point at the problem that they have created over the decades and tells the Government that they are the only ones who can solve it. Putting the solution of the problem into the ruthless, uncaring, money-grabbing hands of those that created it in the first place is an extremely stupid thing to do.



Years ago my young grandson asked me to play the computer game 'Minecraft' with him. I was rubbish. I went every which-way but where I needed to go. After a while he looked me up and down and said "Granny, what is your problem?". That question is very much applicable to those in power and to those who have power — without the 'Granny' bit of course.

Regarding people who don't care: "Someone with antisocial personality disorder will typically be manipulative, deceitful and reckless, and will not care for other people's feelings" (nhs.uk). Food for thought?



UPDATE FROM OUR MID BEDFORDSHIRE MP BLAKE STEPHENSON

The last 12 months have been completely life-changing, and it is an honour to represent Shillington, not just as our ward councillor but as our local Member of Parliament too. In this first update since being elected, I want to start by thanking Shillington Parish Council for the fantastic work they do for the local community.

I may have had to step down from that role, but I know just how important parish councils are to our daily lives and how hard everyone works.

At the start of summer, it may seem odd to be talking about flooding, but our village was hit hard by the floods of last September and I have been very focussed on this throughout Mid Beds. I secured a debate in the House of Commons on the impact of flooding in Mid Beds and how we need to improve resilience. I have continued to question Ministers on the increasing flooding risk from housing growth. And, after applying pressure in Central Bedfordshire Council, the budget now allows for our drains to be cleaned every year, rather than every three years!

I also remain focussed on road safety, which continues to be a priority throughout the county. I recently convened a meeting in Shillington with John, our Parish Council Chair, and representatives from both Central Bedfordshire and the Police so we could press them on the local concerns.

Things are progressing with the Local Plan. Central Bedfordshire Council has now published the results of its 'Call For Sites' and I will continue to monitor the progress of the plan with a keen focus on ensuring we protect our rural villages and beautiful countryside from damaging development. We do need sustainable development, but we need to stand up for our countryside and get the infrastructure our communities need.

I hold regular advice surgeries, drop-in sessions, and public meetings across Mid Beds. If you do need a surgery, please contact blake.stephenson.mp@parliament.uk and my team will be in touch.

RAMBLING ON with DEREK TURNER

In February's *Rambling On*, I delved into the ledger that contains the financial transactions for Hanscombe Memorial Hall from 1911 when it opened. After 1916, a four-year gap in the records means we don't know what was happening there but they resumed suddenly in 1920.



Between the wars, use of the hall was occasional by today's standards. One hundred years ago during June 1925, there were just three social evenings with the hall charging the organisers £1 on each occasion. Two of these were for the village football clubs, Shillington Athletic whose pitch was behind 85 to 103 High Road and Shillington Rangers who played in the meadow behind what is now Woodmer Close. They appear to have buried their rivalry at these socials,

presumably with members mingling and profits shared. The hall received no use at all the following month but money was tight during the inter-war period for many families who could not afford to go out very often.

Many instances of dances or concerts feature in the records. Shillington Starlight Orchestra played 13 times between 1925 and 1927. From 1928 until 1939, the Starlight or Star Follies used the hall on 38 occasions. Was this the same bunch of entertainers operating under a different name? Had the ratio of Shillington members to outsiders dropped or could the treasurer not be bothered to write Shillington each time? If you know anything about this or had relatives who performed with any of these outfits, please let me know. They didn't have a monopoly on gigs at the hall. In 1920, Miss Grundon paid in 15 shillings after the SA Band from Stotfold played, the Dacre Orchestra from Hitchin performed three times during 1925, the Carina Orchestra from Luton also played at three dances in 1925-26 and likewise the Thelma Orchestra in 1926-7.

More serious music was provided by Shillington Choral Society during the early 1920s and there were several Postmen's Concerts that raised money for the Nursing Association that Miss Hanscombe had organised. The Primitive Methodist Church had concerts in 1921 and 22 and Luton Co-operative Society held five from 1932 to 39. Other diversions were occasionally available. Magical Entertainment visited in 1920 as did the Motor Cinema Ltd but it was H. Pettit who showed films during the 1930s. Summerville Repertory Company put on a show in 1923 and the Kingsway Players did so in 1936 and 1939. Village organisations using the Hall included the Bible Society, Women's Unionists, Women's Institute, United Services Men's Club and the Boy Scouts. The Royal Ancient Order of Buffaloes (RAOB), an early version of the Men's Club but with some weird rituals, held a meeting in 1927. If its purpose was to set up a local branch in Shillington, it failed as I can't find another reference to it. Many individuals and families also hired the hall for private parties, wedding receptions and childrens' parties and there were plenty of whist drives and jumble sales.

General Elections from 1922 onwards generated business for the hall with political parties having meetings before the event and polling taking place there on the day. Other occasional uses were by the school dentist and the Weights and Measures Officer who came to check that shopkeepers' scales were accurate and they weren't fleecing their customers.

Of course use of the hall depended on people working behind the scenes to keep it in good order. Miss Elms was caretaker during the 1920s and later Mrs Ansell. The chimney had to be swept each year and H. Breed, George O'Dell and Archie Redman were among those who took on the task. John Cole, Frank Jepps, Edward Tingey and D. Stanghan all did work in the grounds, a long time before the car park covered them with tarmac. Witney Rayner tuned the piano in the 1920s but S. Farmer and Co of Luton had taken over by 1939.

The hall had a bank account from the early days initially with LCW and Parr's Bank when there were a huge number of banks to choose from but takeovers and mergers occurred frequently. Parr's Bank had been founded in 1782 but amalgamated with the London, County and Westminster Bank in 1918 and became Westminster Bank in 1923. Now it's all part of Natwest.

As the 1930s went on, the prospect of war became ever more likely. The first evidence provided by the accounts is on 28 July 1939 when people were being recruited to undertake Air Raid Precautions (ARP). Hostilities began five weeks later on 1 September. We'll take another peak at the accounts during the second world war in another *Rambling On*.

UPDATE



Main focus during the year was completing grant applications suitable for the refurbishment of the Social Club. Funds have been accumulating with contributions from Parish Council, Playing Field Committee, weekly meat raffle and generous donations from the Social Club committee. Phase 1 was completed in December. Works included re-felting the roof, tiles cleaned,

replaced and pointed up. The loft was insulated to building regulations specification. New LED lights were installed replacing the old fluorescent tubes; the inside pillar by the bar was removed and old timber beams and upright steel beams installed, which had to be adjusted to fit the sliding door.

Works on Phase 2 are scheduled to commence sometime in July, when the Social Club will need to be closed. Look out for facebook posts for closure dates. This phase is for the refurbishment of toilets and installation of disabled facilities as well as improvements to bar, cellar and kitchen areas. If there is not enough in the funding pot, it is hoped that some works (internal painting, etc) could be done by local volunteers. All donations to the building fund would be gratefully received as well as additional voluntary support.

Playing Field User Groups have been busy - AFC football had to make use of other locations as well as Shillington due to the number of games during the season as well as a mixture of inclement weather preventing some games not being able to be played on home ground. The Club has been looking at floodlight improvements



as well as trying to resolve parking issues due to insufficient space in the current car parking facility. It is hoped to make the old play area usable as a level car park in the future.



The Spitfires Cricket Club has been growing over last season with new members and a great voluntary maintenance team working hard on the square to make it playable. During winter months members have been netting at Robert Bloomfield Academy and started training at the Playing Field from April. Their first 2025 home match was against Watton-at-Stone on 20th

April. 12 friendly home games are scheduled for the coming season. The Club can't join the Cricket league until they have changing facilities. This is another project requiring funding. Possibly a portacabin shared with AFC football located on the old play area.

The Shillingfest24 event at the end of June proved to be very successful with village organisations, local voluntary groups and businesses coming together raising their profiles as well as fund raising – a great community event, which was well supported. Plans for Shillingfest25 are now well underway with plenty of fun and music for all and high hopes of another successful day, more particularly since we've received confirmation of a flypast by a Hurricane. The event to be opened by our MP – Blake Stephenson. There will also be a flypast by both Hurricane and Spitfire on the following day - 29th June.

The annual fireworks spectacular at the beginning of November last year saw the village community coming together again and was thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended. We continue to fundraise for this event with BBQs run by a great team of volunteers. This year's event is scheduled for Saturday, 1st November.

The Social Club continues to flourish with monthly live bands, fund-raising activities and the occasional party, whilst offering beers, wines and spirits at competitive prices for locals to enjoy. Sky sports on the big screen have encouraged a greater use of the Club facilities, coupled with a dedicated team of volunteers supporting village activities at the Playing Field.

SHILLINGTON CHILDMINDERS

Childminders provide safe, friendly home environments for children to play and have fun whilst gently learning through their play. We take children on outings to farms, play centres, splash parks, museums and libraries, as well as teach them life skills such as helping to do shopping, gardening and cooking.

We are individually registered to Ofsted, have public liability insurance, follow the Early Years Foundation Stage curriculum, undertake regular training including Safeguarding and First Aid and receive regular newsletters and bulletins from professional organisations.

We provide the children with opportunities to learn social skills and experience different play resources at baby/toddler groups and other settings. We are able to cover holidays and other absences for each other where possible.

Some of us are able to provide up to 15 hours of free childcare a week for eligible 2 year olds, as soon as care starts, in the same way that nurseries and pre-schools can. We are also able to provide the free sessions for all 3 and 4 year olds; at least 15 hours per week or up to 30 hours per week (for 38 weeks of the year) depending on parental eligibility and the childminder's policy. The free sessions normally start the term after the child's 3rd birthday. There may be additional charges to cover e.g. food and outings.

We each have differing childcare availability such as before and after school care, daytime childcare, overnight childcare, ad-hoc care or flexible care e.g. for shift workers.

SWEETPEAS

Donna Cameron - Donna's Garden Designs - 2 07833-670934



This time of year is soo busy in the garden. Lots of jobs to do. Sowing seeds; planting perennials and annuals; watering and weeding. But what a lovely time of year everything looking so lush and blooms and buds a plenty! The warm weather has really helped everything along.

I love going into my garden and I'm sure things that weren't there the day before are blooming! I have a bistro set at the end of my garden where I draw my designs and get inspiration. I have designed it so I am im mersed within the flower bed and plants are all around me. Bees buzzing and birds singing. Bliss!

This year by chance I was moving around some things and put an obelisk in the middle of the bed to move it out of the way. When I looked I thought perfect place for it to grow my sweetpeas up!

I chose the variety *Primadonna!* after a friend grew them for me last year and another friend sent me a mammoth variety this year so look forward to seeing these too! They know what I like! I do love Sweetpeas. My sister had them as her wedding flowers and featured on her invites.

They are so easy to grow and you can buy seed or plants for a couple of pounds and give you endless bouquets of fragrant flowers. The more you pick the more they keep giving. When they reach four leaves in growth pinch them out so they bush out, are stronger and provide more flowers. Train them up an obelisk and they will soon grow up it and feed once a week with a liquid fertiliser. A tip I learnt from my great uncle, who was a gardener, was to take off the tendrils to get extra long strong stems for the vase. He used to show them.

You can get so many different shades of sweetpeas although I think the pastel ones are my favourites. The scent is dreamy. There is a Perennial variety but it has no scent and is very vigorous. Sweetpeas were first recorded by a monk in Sicily in 1695 and there is an old fashioned variety named after him *Cupani*. By the 19th Century they were commercially bred and Henry Eckford, a Scottish nursery man, crossbred and developed the Grandiflora varieties with bigger blooms. They were very popular in Victorian times and were a sign of friendship.

There are now over 200 varieties, all of them gorgeous! So give them a go and you won't regret it!

PEGSDON HILLS AND HOO BIT



Steep hills and tranquil valleys in the Chilterns with magnificent views of the countryside

Location: South of Barton Road (B655), Pegsdon, Bedfordshire, SG5 3GS

Know before you go: Size 79 hectares / Grazing animals / Walking trails / Tracks and paths across the grassland can be steep and uneven / Dogs on a lead / Open at all times.

Best time to visit: April to June / July to September / October to March

Environmental designation: Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI)

About the reserve:

One of the jewels of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, Pegsdon Hills' steep chalk hills offer some of the best views in the county.

In spring, moschatel, or town-hallclock, named after the arrangement of its flowers, can be found in the woodland, while dingy and grizzled skipper butterflies flutter around in the grassland.

With summer arrives the smell of fresh herbs like wild thyme, marjoram and wild basil. The melodious song of the skylark is heard around the reserve. After dark the eerie green luminescence of glow-worms emanates from the grassland a flower-rich overhead. Hoo Bit, once a larch plantation, is now meadow, surrounded by woodland. White helleborine flowers in large numbers beneath the dense shade of beech trees. In autumn, honeysuckle, black bryony and old-man'sbeard drape over trees and shrubs offering seeds and berries to hungry birds and small mammals.

In winter, fallow deer skirt along the woodland edge, while flocks of birds feed on seeds in hedgerow and field. We coppice in the wood and fell trees to allow light to reach the woodland floor. The deep earthwork on the Bedfordshire / Hertfordshire county boundary was once a barrier to free passage, situated as it is near to the ancient route of the Icknield Way. Large, multi-stemmed beech trees now mark its presence. Strip lynchets, or cultivation terraces, are evidence of an ancient settlement and there is a series of small quarries indicating former small-scale mineral extraction. The grassland is grazed and we remove scrub to prevent succession.




